What is Innovation?

"Change Which Adds Value"

"Innovation is the creation and progression of new products, services, processes and business models that provide economic or social value".

Innovation Theory

Traditional innovation theory - linear 'pipeline' model beginning with R&D support and moving along a conveyor belt of product and technology development.

New model based on the 'ecology' of innovation. Innovation is not restricted in terms of where or how it develops, and in many respects it is attitudinal in nature.

The creation of new paths for technological development within a city-region depends critically on that region's previous history. The City's past development determines three things:

- Types of occupation/skills available to support different sectors.
- Knowledge assets and infrastructure from private and collective investment.
- Individual and collective capacities available to exploit learning and knowledge.

New economic pathways can also be opened by diversifying into new industries closely related to existing ones, a phenomenon known as 'clustered diversity'.

Innovation is the process of turning knowledge and ideas into value. An "urban innovation engine" is a system which can trigger, generate, foster and catalyze innovation in the city.

In the research of knowledge development the role of the city acts as a hub for intensive flows and exchanges of knowledge among its habitants and additional stakeholders.

Why not weave the learning from the business and urban worlds by attempting to apply the dimensions of innovation ecology models to knowledge cities

Innovation engines create the notion of "urban innovation engines". Based on this concept, provides a set of guidelines for creating a knowledge city using innovation engines as its building blocks, and innovation ecology elements as an important part of its operating system.

Embedding a culture of Innovation and Opportunity capture is not difficult, the basic needs are simply:

- Management commitment
- KPI's
- Tools for thinking and evaluation
- Innovation Circles' to fuel the 'culture'
- Success stories to fuel enthusiasm

Once these are in place the outcome of ever improved prosperity is inevitable.
